Trump Administration

- New approach and new priorities
 - Decentralized decision-making, greater reliance on Congress for policy
 - Cabinet officials and senior staff aren't DC insiders
- "Destabilized" federal workforce—hiring freeze, slow transition, budget cuts
- Trump's tools: Exec Orders; Twitter; shadow cabinet; regulatory freeze
- Opposition: Democrats; State Attorneys General; Governors



Congress

- United Party Control
 - House: 241 Republicans; 194 Democrats
 - Senate: 52 Republicans; 48 Democrats
- Different factions of each party
 - Freedom Caucus
 - Progressive Democrats
- Many new(ish) Republicans
 - Less than half of House of Representatives voted on Affordable Care Act








Federal Funding Process

FY17 Funding

- FY17 funding expires on April 28th
- Three potential outcomes
 - Omnibus
 - CR through October 1st
 - Government shutdown



FY18 Funding


- President Trump's released "skinny budget" in March
 - Would cut \$54 B from non-defense discretionary programs
- House and Senate appropriators moving forward with regular order
- Budget deal to stop sequestration?

Opportunities

- Funding
 - Basic research
 - Defense research and national security (cybersecurity, materials, etc.)
 - Infrastructure
- Reduced regulatory environment
- Public-private partnerships



Looking ahead

- GOP legislative agenda
 - Tax reform
 - Infrastructure bill
- Mid-term election in 2018
 - In Senate, Ds defending 25 seats (10 states Trump won); Rs defending 8 seats (1 state Clinton won—NV)
 - Very few competitive districts in House
- Controversies and investigations
